Craftsman's Guild

There are some exciting things happening on Thursdays here in Unser Hafen. The Craftsman's Guild is meeting every first and third Thursday of the month. So far we have done leather bottles, felting, and casting belt fittings and other findings out of pewter in soapstone molds. On the schedule for the coming months we are continuing to explore casting techniques and are venturing into making period shoes. For those that would like to participate, soapstone blanks are avalible for \$5, and the pewter is sold by finished weight after you cast your pieces. Folks are welcome to bring their own pewter to melt if you don't wish to purchase ours. You can get pewter plates at thrift stores sometimes and that makes it a lot less expensive.

For the Period Shoe project, we are recommending that you bring an old sock and some extra canvas or heavy weight fabric to be cut up to make a pattern, so before we cut into the leather we should have a good pattern to go off of. Leather for this project is up to the individual, but there had been discussion about buying some sole leather as a group. 
How to Get Out of the Mud in the Middle Ages

Walking out-of-doors in the mediæval period was a messy business. Mud, water, rocks, grasses, scat, all had to be dealt with. Shoes in the eleventh century and onward, especially for those with money, were not made for this type of environment. Something had to be done.

Pattens, from the French 'pate' meaning claw or hoof, were created to raise the wearer off of the ground and give them a bit of grip. The soles were either made from wood or from multiple layers of leather. Ceather straps went around the tops of the shoes. They began as simple clog-like over-sandals, but in the fifteenth century became fashion statements, sometimes even being worn, alone like sandals.



The Craftsmen's Guild is ready to make shoes. Perhaps some pattens might be a good idea to go along with simple leather shoes?

With the recent discovery of the burial place and bones of England's King

Richard III you might be interested in hearing a bit about what has been going on:

The Middle Ages Return to

Twenty-first Century England

'A horse! A horse! My kingdom for a horse!' (Shakespeare, William. Richard III)

Amidst pomp and pageantry, King Richard III was laid to rest once again, this time in Leicester Cathedral on 26 March 2015. England's Richard III, known to us best through Shakespeare's play, was found buried beneath a car park in Leicester in the middle of England. In 1986 a paper was published suggesting that he was buried in the Church of the Grey Friars which, if not destroyed by twentieth-century construction, was probably under the city somewhere. In 2011 a group from the University of Leicester decided to start looking for the Church of the Grey Friars and Richard's burial place. On 5 September 2012 they found a skeleton which was obviously hurriedly buried, without a coffin and in a space too short requiring the head to be up at an odd angle. The skull showed two wounds to the skull, and a very crooked spine.





A direct descendent of Richard's sister, Anne of York, was found in Canada. His mitochondrial DNA was a perfect match for that of the skeleton. King Richard III had been found!

After much deliberation, fighting and planning, the remains of King Richard III were reinterred in a specially created tomb in Leicester Cathedral, the nearest cathedral to the location of his death.



With the skull a likeness was created forensically. DNA suggests that Richard's eyes were blue, and his hair fair, but likely it darkened with age.





This portrait was painted sometime between 1515-1520, some thirty-plus years after his death. It shows no malformation of body, yet sources from his period and into the next century claim variousknew the late king wrote: 'He was little of stature, ill fetured of limmes, croke backed, his left shoulder much higher than his right, hard favoured of visage' (More, Thomas. History of King Richard III) Another from the same period, Polydore Vergil (1470-1555) wrote that 'he was lyttle of

stature, deformyd of body, thone showlder being higher than thother, a short and sowre cowntenance, which semyd to savor of mischief and utter evydently craft and deceyt.' (Vergil, Polydore. English History) malformations. Sir Thomas More (1478-1535), who could possibly have spoken with people whknew the late king wrote: 'He was little of stature, ill fetured of limmes, croke backed, his left shoulder much higher than his right, hard favoured of visage' (More, Thomas. History of King Richard III) Another from the same period, Polydore Vergil (1470-1555) wrote that 'he was lyttle of stature, deformyd of body, thone showlder being higher than thother, a short and sowre cowntenance, which semyd to savor of mischief and utter evydently craft and deceyt.' (Vergil, Polydore. English History)

Born in 1452 during the War of the Roses, Richard Plantagenet was the youngest son of Richard, Duke of York who was a cousin of King Henry VI.

The War of the Roses, 1455-1485, was a civil war between two families claiming the English throne through Edward III, the York family (the white rose) and the Lancaster family (the red rose). Upon the death of Henry VI Richard's eldest brother seized the throne. Edward IV (of the York family) then quietly married a Lancastrian widow. Because of her status their children were declared illegitimate. Following considerable strife and the death of his brother, Richard was installed as king in 1483. It is believed that Richard then had his nephews, the sons of Edward IV, murdered in the Tower of London in order to protect his claim to the throne. It was also suspected that Richard may have killed Henry VI, and later poisoned his own wife.

In spite of these suspicions Richard was known as 'the most famous prince of blessed memory.' (City of York Records, 1485) And Thomas Langton, the Bishop of St. David's wrote to a friend 'On my trouth I lyked never the condicions of ony prince so wel as his; God hathe sent hym to us for the wele of all...' The website 'What History Has to Say about Richard III' (http://www.richard111.com/what_history_has_to_say_about_ri.htm) has nothing but praise for this king in spite of the murderous rumours.

Following continued strife between the two families, the Lancastrian Henry Tudor killed Richard at the Battle of Bosworth in 1485 and began the Tudor era as Henry VII. He married Elizabeth of York the next year which united the two families and ended the War of the Roses. Henry then put the two roses together to make what has lasted through the ages as the Tudor Rose.



The celebrations for the reinterment of King Richard III began with a procession on 22 March 2015 from the University of Leicester to Bosworth Field, the site of his death, and on to Leicester Cathedral. 8,000 people visited as he lay in state. Then on 26 March the service was held for his reinternment. It included a Catholic sermon in homage to his own religion, a poem written for him and read by the star of the television series Sherlock, and an anthem composed for the occasion by British composer Judith Bingham. For the text Bingham viewed Richard's own books held in the British Library. She chose the text from *The Book of Ghostly Grace* by thirteenth-century St. Mechtilde. Bingham is a personal friend and the subject of my doctoral dissertation. *Ghostly Grace* was sung as the coffin was lowered into its final resting place.



After more than <u>five-hundred</u> years, King Richard III has found his final resting place.

Eleanor of Aquitaine

Queen Consort of France and England

Louis finally managed to get his marriage to Eleanor annulled on 21 March, 1152. Eleanor immediately returned to her homelands and went about the business of ruling. Being the most eligible and wealthy woman at that time, she escaped at least two kidnap attempts. This must have prompted her to write to Henry in England to come marry her soon. Some modern historians have most likely mistakenly interpreted this as a proposal from her. On 18 May, two months following her annulment, Eleanor and Henry quietly got married in Poitiers Cathedral. Technically, Eleanor was Louis' ward, and should have asked his permission to marry, but the couple anticipated his reaction. Louis became furious at losing such a large portion of land, but although much younger, Henry was the stronger man. Louis attempted raids on Eleanor's land but was quickly defeated.

Henry went back to England, leaving Eleanor pregnant and ruling Aquitaine.



In August of 1153 their son William was born (which must have infuriated Louis, but also reassured him that God had not meant for them to have been married). Earlier in the summer, Eustace, King Stephen's son and heir had died. The Treaty of Wallingford (1153) allowed Stephen to rule for life, but made Henry of Anjou heir to his throne (Britannica.com). Stephen died the following October and on 19 December 1154 Henry II and Eleanor were crowned in Westminster Abbey. The Abbey at that time was of Norman/Romanesque architecture, probably looking something like the building that Henry II is holding in the painting above, with rounded Romanesque arches like the border above his head. The Westminster Abbey that we know today was begun on 16 May 1220 during the reign of Henry and Eleanor's son, Henry III (Westminser-Abbey.org).

English society during Eleanor's reign was feudal. The king ruled 'by the grace of God.' He was aided by his nobles who each controlled the land and people surrounding their castle. It was during this time that the original wooden keeps of these castles were replaced with the stone keeps that we see today. Under the lord was a constable who ruled in his absence. The lord's military consisted of knights who, when not on campaigns, participated in illegal tourneys. Tourneys were not legalized and made respectable until 1194 by another son of Henry and Eleanor, Richard I, also known as Richard the Lionheart.

Eleanor's beauty was legendary. The German songs entitled Carmina Burana wrote:

If all the world were mine
From the seashore to the Rhine,
That price were not too high
To hve England's Queen lie
Close in my arms. (Owen, Eleanor of Aquitaine)

Philippe de Thaün wrote:

God save Lady Eleanor,

Queen, who is the arbiter Of honour, wit and beauty, Of largess and loyalty. Lady, born were you in a happy hour And wed to Henry, King. (Weir, p. 126)

Yet, chroniclers seem to have seen no reason to mention Eleanor very much during Henry's reign. Births were, of course, recorded, but little else. There is, however, evidence that she did utilize the power given to queens in the twelfth century, 'sharers in the imperial kingship.' (Ibid, p. 126) Henry was frequently away at war, so Eleanor must have acted as his regent. Documents exist under her name and seal until 1163 (Ibid, 126). Her rulings, written in Latin, were signed 'Eleanor, by the Grace of God, Queen of England.' (Ibid, p. 127) As time wore on, her importance and control increased. In her great riches she was a big benefactor to the Church.
