Brains and Brawn: A team is as only as strong as its weakest link. Will that link be you or your noble steed? This will be a two part challenge to test the strength and the wisdom of each riding pair. For the first half, you and your steed will have to navigate a set course that will be filled with obstacles that you will have to face as a team. For the second half, you will be tested on your wisdom. The second half will be timed, so the quickest will win high points! Will you be ready?

Don't Hit the Stags: The royal stags have wandered onto the equestrian field and made it their new home. Equestrians must complete the course without hitting one of the Queen's prized stags. The faster you go the more points you will earn, however, slay the stag and you'll lose points. There is no telling how many stags have made it onto the field or where they have chosen to rest.

Longs Peak Scottish Irish Festival Demo

It's time to start thinking about the Longs Peak Scottish Irish Festival Demo in Estes Park. This year we are looking for fighters, fencers, archers, artisans and Hospitaller types, to participate in the demo on Friday, September 11th through Sunday, September 13th, 2015. We need participants who can work anything from one day to all three days. You will receive free entry passes and free parking passes, for the days you work, and will be given some time during the day to go off and enjoy the festival.

Participants are expected to be in garb between the hours of 8 AM and 5 PM each day. Overnight camping is available in the living history area, but all modern tents must be taken down daily. We will provide some food for breakfast and lunch, but expect a brass-bowl donation from those who partake. In addition there will be water, hot water, tea and coffee available. Loading/unloading times when you can drive down to the living history area are between 6 AM – 8 AM and 5:30 PM – 8:30 PM daily.

We would like to increase the number of craft demos going on during the day. We have had great response for the wood carving, calligraphy & illumination, leather working and weaving demos over the past couple of years and would like to expand on this. I'm thinking chain mail, jewelry making, arrow fletching, bead making and maybe even candle making are possibilities. If you can think of anything else and would like to give it a try, please call me and we will discuss your needs. Please bring your own chairs & stools (as period as possible or bring covers for them); we will have tables but chairs are hard to come by. If your craft requires pounding on things, you might want to bring your own table, as well.

I hope to see some of you on the archery field July 12th for the practice and at "Here There be Dragons," July 24 – 26.

Inlandish - May

We had at least 6 archers from Unser Hafen shooting at Inlandish, to include Baron Tracker & Lord Lorcan.

Inlandish (Rain-Landish) was very productive, despite the rain. We had four competitors for the baronial champion : Lord Thomas Marston (Ronald Whittaker), Lady Cecelia (Kim Creed), Lord Val Bjorn Juleson (Richard Vinson) & My Lord Thorvald from Fort Morgan. Lord Thomas Marston was declared the winner and new Baronial Warden. Special congratulations to Lady Cecelia for her first ever SCA archery shoot, she actually scored a hit on the pirate ship target at about 50 yards. Lord Lorcan's lovely lady did an excellent showing of horse archery in the equestrians.

Lord Lorcan & Lord Thomas were both admitted as a "Champion of the Order of the Guardians of Unser Hafen !!"

Congratulations to all the winners & competitors of Unser Hafen, along with their supporters at Inlandish.

Renaissance Festival Domo - June

The fair was a success I believe. We had quite a few people interested in the archery, hopefully there might be some future Scadians.

The Archers set up some equipment to show fletching, bow string making and several period type exhibition shoots.

Northern Realms War - June

There was one archer from Unser Hafen at NRW, Lord Thomas Marston (Ronald Whittaker), and there were about a dozen others from the Outlands.

There were three archery tournaments held on Friday & Saturday, The Outlands won all 3 for the war points.

Friday – William Tell Shoot, shooting apples off a manikin head, the winner was Lord Thomas Marston from Unser Hafen.

Saturday AM - Clout shoot at 80 & 100 yards with 3 strings of 6 arrows at each distance. Lady Kirstin Inn Tasalda (Christina Lett) from the Barony of Caerthe won with a score of 71 out of a possible 180 points.

Lord Thomas Marston scored the highest single round score of 21 out of a possible 30 points on the last round of the 100 yard portion.

Saturday PM – Wood Walk was won by Jamile ibn Samir ibn Daud al'Wadi (Jamie Wendell) of Caerthe with a score of 16 out of a possible 33 points.

Congratulation to all of the Unser Hafen fighters, and their supporters who valiantly showed their skills in the various fights, sieges & mealeas they participated in representing our Kingdom and Barony.

Heroes & Legends - June

We had a very large showing for the archery. In the morning we had about 24 archers shooting on the line including several youths and we even had a few gentlemen from the Renaissance Festival show up also.

In the afternoon we took care of the zombie hoard that was plaguing our fair barony. There were 13 adults and 2 youth shooters, including five from Unser Hafen. We succeeded in ridding the barony of all zombies. In total, 238 zombies were killed, 63 hostages were saved (only 2 hostages were lost) and 28 zombie flies, mosquitoes and cockroaches killed by our two youth archers. We also had the aid of archers from the Canton of Hawks Hollow, The Barony of Caer Galen, the Barony of Caerthe & the Barony of Dragonsspine in this quest.

The two archers with the highest zombie kills were:

THL Tyrfingr von Wolfsberg from the Canton of Hawks Hollow with 43 zombies killed

Lord Duhhgahl from the Barony of Caerthe with 33 zombies killed.

The two youth archers from the Barony of Caer Galen did an amazing job decimating the zombie mosquitoes, flies & cockroaches with no survivors:

My Lord Eramus Nuttycombe (Remy Flenney) with 15 zombie bugs & 1 zombie rat killed.

My Lady Sophia Nuttycombe (Lillian Flenney) with 13 zombie bugs killed

The Unser Hafen archers were:

2. Lord Val Bjorn (Richard Vinson) with 22 zombies killed.

Lavinia Fontana: A Study in Details

Living primarily in Bologna, Italy from 1552 to 1614, Lavinia Fontana made her fortune and that of her family with a paintbrush in her hand. Born to a father who was both a painter and a teacher [3], Lavinia received training generally open only to men. Both her body of work and range of topics were vast; approximately 150 works survive and many more were inventoried.

"Lavinia has come to be recognized as Europe's first female painter to attain professional success." [1 page 1]

There is much about Lavinia that fascinates me from an unconventional marriage contract [3], a marriage/partnership that produced eleven children, her wide ranging choice of topic "...portraits, altarpieces, private devotional works and mythological paintings." [1, page 1] and her adroit interactions with the nobility who were her clients. While there are few books in English about Lavinia Fontana her body of works demonstrates, in my opinion, a primary factor in her success. Throughout the 16th century clothing was an important symbol of position, stature and success. Men demonstrated their successes through their clothing and tried via sumptuary laws to be sure that those with less success did not falsely portray themselves as more successful than they were. The demonstration of wealth and success was elevated to an art form by Eleanora di Toledo, wife of Cosimo d'Medici (4). Her elevation of female dress as a symbol of prosperity and success was emulated throughout the city states of Italy.

"A status symbol is a perceived visible, external denotation of one's social position and perceived indicator of economic or social status." [2] To display and 'document' your status was partially accomplished in the 16th century by having your picture painted. Lavinia Fontana's paintings show a level of detail in the fabrics and the embellishments that are rarely seen in her contemporaries. Sofonisba Anguissola was a contemporary of Lavinia Fontana. Both daughters of artists they painted similar subjects for similar audiences. The comparison of the self portraits of the two young women is dramatic.

The richness of the fabric, the details of the undergarment showing at neck and wrist are barely seen in this portrait.

In Lavinia's self portrait the detail is amazing. Each pearl can be seen, the lace on her collar is so clear you can almost feel it. Each fold of fabric, each drape or crease is clearly seen both on her and on the maidservant in the background.

It is perhaps in the pictures she painted late in her career where Lavinia Fontana's amazing attention to detail is shown most clearly. When she had established herself as a successful artist she was able to determine her subjects. Overwhelmingly she chose the women and widows of Bologna. As stated by Caroline Murphy [1-page 159] "These women were anxious to leave a visual legacy which recorded their state and their commitment to family, faith and philanthropy, as well as, through their clothing, their commitment to widowhood itself"

The pink taffeta may rustle in a breeze, the sleeves boast of meticulously pinked fabric edged in lace; every element tells you this is a woman of wealth and importance.

The fabrics are without life and drape in this portrait giving little or no indication of the status of the subjects.

The froth of lace, the pearls and buttons are all depicted with such detail that no element can be missed. The veil that stands out from the head is edged in gold and pinned on with gold hair pins. Elegance and richness of dress are indicators of the success of the family and there can be no doubt as to the status of this woman.

My interest in Lavinia Fontana's work began as a costumer who reveled in the details shown in her portraits. As I continue to study both her work and her life I have come to respect and admire a woman who painted when few women painted, shouldered the burden of supporting her parents and her family [she bore eleven children] all by understanding the underlying needs and wants of her clients.

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Eleanor of Aquitaine Queen Consort of France and England

During the mid 12th century the legends of King Arthur became very popular, so much so that Henry began a search at Glastonbury Abbey for the burial of Arthur and Guinevere. Bones were found, along with a cross inscribed 'Here lies Arthur, the famous king, in the Island of Avalon.' (Weir, p. 131) (I have visited the ruins of Glastonbury Abbey and seen the burial markers of the legendary King Arthur and his Guinevere.)

Court living during that period was less than glamorous. The Court moved continually, and the royal castles and palaces were less than ideal living spaces. Stone buildings are terribly cold, even in the warmth of summer. It is no wonder that the garb of the period includes so many layers, making the wearing of such garb very unpleasant in modern centrally heated buildings. Also, the stench from the sewage surrounding the buildings must have been tremendous. Even the food was appalling as recorded at the time by Peter of Blois. When moving from place to place the Queen would have ridden on horseback or in a wagon without springs. Any roads would have been unpaved, muddy ruts making wagon travel virtually unbearable. Eleanor also frequently traveled to her lands in France, pregnant or not. Channel crossings were and still are notoriously bad. Along with the Court would have traveled the household staff and the enormous retinue of actors, musicians, jesters, scholars and even whores and pimps (Ibid, p. 134).

Henry's appetite for sex was voracious. Even with innumerable liaisons, he still found much time to spend with his wife as evidenced by their eight children.

Henry and Eleanor's children were quite famous in their own rights: William, the first son, died at age three; Henry 'the Younger,' who did not like his inheritance and rebelled against his father only to fail and die of dysentery; Richard I "the Lionheart" who inherited the throne upon his father's death in 1189; Geoffrey, Duke of Brittany who joined his brother Henry and the French in the rebellion against their father and was noted for his treachery; John 'Lackland,' who outlived his brothers and inherited his father's throne in 1199. Their daughters married royalty throughout Europe.

In 1173 Eleanor chose to leave Henry and return to Aquitaine with her son Richard. Henry did not seem to mind, probably as he had quite an affair going on with Rosamond de Clifford. His lust was obvious from the way all of the nobles kept their wives and daughters away from court. In Aquitaine Eleanor could rule autonomously rather than under the thumb of her husband. Her Court in Poitiers was noted as a center of chivalry, patronage, the troubadour culture and a place of courtly love (Ibid, p. 174).

Because of Henry's allocation of land and titles amongst his sons, and possibly because of his infidelities, his sons revolted against him in 1173. Eleanor gave them military support, and paid for it when the revolt failed by being imprisoned until Henry's death in 1189.

Once freed, Eleanor played a large part in the governing of England. While Richard was off on his Crusade she acted as his administrator. When he was captured she collected the ransom and travelled to escort him home. She also managed to keep Richard's reign in tact while he was away. Both her son John Lackland and Philip II Augustus of France attempted to take over Richard's kingdom. Amazingly, at age eighty she crossed the Pyrenees Mountains to get her granddaughter, to marry her off to the son of the French king, trying to keep the peace between the Plantagenet rule of England and the Capetian rule of France. (Pernod, Encyclopaedia Britannica website) Eleanor died four years later in 1204 as a nun in a monastery in France having lived a very long and full life; a life twice as long as the life expectancy of that time. I am very proud to have descended through her
