August 3 - Ouarterly Populace Revel, 2:00 - 6:00, Lady Cecilia's house, 1905 North County Road 23, Bellvue. The space is a beautiful valley shaded by trees, often with a light breeze. It will include tournaments in Rapier, Heavy and Archery, a discussion group about Service, the Craftsman's Guild will be teaching and working on leather working.

Bring your archery equipment, foam swords and regular gear for fighter practice for heavies and rapier. Also bring a chair. Water will be provided. Bring food for your family and, if possible, to share. The Baronial paper products and tables will be available. Be sure to bring bug repellant in case the day is absolutely still. And don't forget your musical instruments...

Directions:

From the south:

Scenic Route:

Get to Overland Trail and Drake. Go north on Drake to Dixon Canyon Road (42C) that climbs up to the scenic drive north and around Horsetooth Reservoir. Dixon Canyon Road turns into NCR 23. From Drake/Dixon Canyon Road to Lady Cecilia's place is 6 miles. There will be an opening in the fence with orange cones on the fence pots which is the entrance. You can park up by the road, or drive down by the trees.

Normal Route:

Get to Overland Trail and go north to Bingham Hill Road. Turn left (North) on Bingham Hill and go over the hill. Bingham Hill Road ends at NCR 23. From that 'T' go south 0.9 miles. Just past the second house by the road on NCR 23 will be an opening in the fence with orange cones on the fence pots which is the entrance. You can park up by the road, or drive down by the trees.

From the north:

From Vern's Place on old Highway 287 take Rist Canyon Road to Bellvue and turn south on NRC 23. Go south on NCR 23 1.2 miles. There will be an opening in the fence with orange cones on the fence pots which is the entrance. You can park up by the road, or drive down by the trees.

August 9 - Scribal Calligraphy Gathering, 1:00 - 4:00 at Wellmark, 3601 El Caminito Court, Loveland. We will focus on learning new scripts, but anything scribal will work!

Coronation Event Report

Unser Hafen hosted the Outlands Spring Coronation on May 10 and 11th, 2014. Coronation court on Saturday was held at the I.O.O.F Lodge in downtown Loveland. The plan for

Sunday's events was moved indoors to Sir Flanagan's TASC space in North Caerthe because of a late Spring snow storm.

By the numbers:

Net Profit: \$2595; Tithe to Kingdom \$1047; net to Unser Hafen \$1548.

Attendees: 270; including 36 non-members. Those who stayed for feast; 100; feast cost \$645 and brought in \$795. Sunday tournaments at TASC attracted about 100 fighters, fencers, and spectators. Gate brought in \$4,405 of which \$1500 was pre-paid site reservations; Site costs for Saturday and Sunday totaled \$900. The donation lunch brought in \$500.00 at a cost of \$205. Site tokens cost \$67 for materials; general supplies cost \$57.

The silent auction for the Kingdom travel fund brought in about \$946.

Kingdom of the Outlands - Warrior Games

Games and sport were used in period to prepare warriors for battle. One such game was the game of tag. Warrior games is a tag based game using padded equipment. Each local group can adapt the game to their needs.

Equipment

- Equipment- The group should look at other LARP and Foam Fighting group's equipment and decide what will work for their group as far as spears, swords, shields, javelins, archery, axes etc. These groups have many tutorials online on how to build this equipment. Weapons should always be tested and checked.
- Garb- It is recommended that folks where garb to further enhance the ambiance of the game.
- If the head is a target, then a helm, rapier mask or some other form of head protection should be used. The group can decide on other protection as needed such as throat and groin protection etc.
- Age restrictions- All participants should have their appropriate waivers signed. Age restrictions shall be determined by the group. Fourteen and above and below are recommend age groups.

Rules: Before a session of play the rules should be decided on.

- Determine target areas- This could be heavy or rapier target areas or some variation.
- Determine blow force- The group can decide if they would like touch, or have a solid blow or variation for force.
- Tagging from behind- The group can use Heavy and Rapier conventions, a light tap to the back or variation.
- Rules of the scenario. A group can use traditional SCA scenario's, explore the variety of game scenarios that many of the LARP groups play, or create their own. If played properly, this game can create community between your Heavies, Rapier, Archery and any other communities. It can be a fun warm up, alternative on a hot day, introduction to the SCA, or quest scenario. The sky is the limit, but remember, "Safety First." In service to the Baron and Baroness

I have two holes in my head! The first was drilled behind my right ear, and was the size of a quarter. Two years later it was enlarged. This past May I had my third trephanation surgery to add a quarter-sized hole behind my left ear. These holes are for Meniérè's Disease, a problem with the inner ear causing balance problems, tinnitus and, in extreme cases, deafness. Consequently, this topic seemed particularly relevant.

Trephanation (or trepanation) comes from the Greek word *trypanon* which means 'to bore,' or 'borer.' It specifically refers to the surgical boring of holes in the skull. A piece of the skull is removed, uncovering the dura mater which is the covering of the brain. Even in the days before cleanliness, anesthetic and antibiotics, there was a good chance for patient survival. Many skulls found by archaeologists show evidence of regrowth, meaning that the subject lived for a good period of time following the surgery.

Since neither the bone nor the skull have pain receptors, the surgery was probably not as traumatic as it sounds. No doubt large amounts of alcohol were imbibed. In South America coca was probably used, while in medieval Europe poppies and nightshades may have been used.

Thought to be the most ancient surgery, trepanned skulls have been found dating back some 40,000 years in Cro-Magnon people. These holes are circular, up to two inches in diameter. The largest concentration of trepanned skulls have been found in Peru and Bolivia, dating approximately 2000 B.C.E.. These surgeries were probably performed for psychotic disorders, epilepsy, or chronic migraines. The holes allowed the demons supposedly causing these conditions to escape.

Hippocrates, c. 400 B.C.E, wrote about trephanation for head injuries to remove skull pieces which were pushing on the brain. In the first century C.E. writings refer to the use of tools similar to carpenter's drills to perform this type of surgery. Trephines, as the tools are called, have been refined through the years, from a sharp-edged flint scraper in the pre-metallurgic era all the way to the modern day electric drill for the home trephanation. (Yes, people really do it to themselves! They think that it improves the blood flow, relieves anxiety, depression, better ability to recall dreams, lessening of chronic headaches, higher energy levels and allows for a better emotional life. I cannot say that these things have been improved by the holes in my head!)


The techniques used have been:

- Grooving: drilling the bone by turning a sharp tool, stone or metal, moving to different locations until a round hole is achieved.
- Scraping: scraping the bone back and forth with a sharp stone tool until the dura mater is exposed.

• Boring: using a drill or drill like instrument, or a sharp knife to drill through the skull.


Interestingly enough, the mortality rate increased when metal tools began to be available. Freshly knapped stone tools were sterile, while even with washing the metal tools retained bacteria. During the pre-Columbian period a poultice of the bark of the calabash tree and saliva helped to prevent infections. It was then a long time before antibiotics.

Inca skulls show evidence of the use of a knife to cut and then scrape the skull away as seen in the drawing below.

The photo below shows a skull trepanned with a drill. The smoothing of the hole is a sign that the patient lived for some time after the surgery.




A trepanned skull


Paintings and drawings from the Middle Ages are proof that trephanation was performed during that time. The series of paintings below, dated c. 1300, show the grisly process.



Hieronymous Bosch painted this version (1494) of the surgery taking place out in a field. (I love the surgeon's funnel hat, and the woman observer balancing a book on her head. Leave it to Hieronymous Bosch!)



A 1573 drawing shows some of the trephines used. (I hope these is not what my surgeon used!)



This sixteenth-century woodcut shows the unsanitary conditions of the surgery. Notice the cat catching a rat in the bottom right corner.

In conclusion, whether for the release of demons or for truly medical reasons, trephanation was a widely used surgery with survival for the lucky patients. Personally I am really glad to have been completely knocked out during my surgery. The recovery has been traumatic enough.
